Figure 11: Greatest contributors to an increase in membership fees over the last 10 years





ABOUT HECTORVILLE SPORT & COMMUNITY CLUB

The Hectorville Sports and Community Club (HSCC) is located on Daly Oval in Magill and is home to over 1,000 active members. Utilised year-round, the HSCC offers a range of sports including Australian Rules Football, Cricket, Tennis and Netball at both junior and senior levels. For the past seven years, the Hectorville Sports and Community Club has committed itself to a journey of transformation and improvement, which saw the club awarded 2013 National Club of the Year at the Good Sports Awards.



The operations of the HSCC are overseen by a management committee, the members of which - in addition to being passionate 'Heccies' members - possess expertise in a variety of key areas such as finance, administration and stakeholder management. The club also counts an elected member of the local council as one of its committee members.

The skills and determination of the club's management has facilitated a strong improvement in the culture and operations of the club. In particular, the committee has placed emphasis on sustainability by taking steps to improve energy efficiency within the club and developing a broader revenue base to support its operations.

DOES YOUR MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE REGULARLY DISCUSS YOUR CLUB'S FINANCE AND REVENUE BASE?

In January 2014, as part of a commitment to increasing the sustainability of the club, the HSCC undertook an energy audit to review its electricity usage. The audit identified that the club's electricity usage was dominated by refrigeration; heating, ventilation and air-conditioning (HVAC); and lighting on the oval and tennis/netball courts.




FIGURE1: Electricity end use breakdown
